


The CEJH is an international youth organisation for horticulturists and florists.

The CEJH was founded in 1965 in Thun, Switzerland. Founding nations were France and Germany, but soon after, Austria and Switzerland joined the community. Today the CEJH consists of several member nations all over Europe. In 1953 the first meeting of young horticulturists was organized in Hamburg and seven years later the first 7-day CEJH congress took place. Since then a 7-day congress was held in a European country every year. Recently participating countries have been Austria, Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany, Sweden, Denmark, Italy, Switzerland, Czech Republic, England and Estonia.



The tasks of the CEJH are as follows:

organisations for young horticulturists; to represent the interests and relevancies of the European youth being closely connected with horticultural professions in the public; to support the education and the developing of one's knowledge of horticulture; to enact the youth to act responsible; to contribute to the creation of a united Europe; to collaborate with similar horticultural youth organisations in Europe.




09.07. Labie Koki, Pindstrup, Baltezers






12.07. Laheema National Park, Palmse Manor, Jägala Waterfall
